
We're creating our calendar of events and workshops for 2019 now.

Enviroschool trip to St John's Hill School!

Over the years we've had loads of requests to go and visit some other Enviroschools to see exemplars. Most recently we've done a road trip to St John's Hill School in Whanganui. Our fabulous Kindergarten Association Enviroschools Facilitator Lizzy Brouwers has captured the evidence beautifully.

St John's Hill School acquired 'GREEN-GOLD' status in 2002!

A group of enthusiastic teachers, along with Lauree Jones, co-ordinator for Taranaki Enviroschools, had the pleasure of visiting this amazing school and being hosted by friendly students and teachers.

Three senior children were our ambassadors. They showed us their video of the school's journey and then took us on a tour of the grounds.

Important points to note were:

- Their Mission Statement and
- Their Care Code, both displayed on large boards at the bus stop
- The Weather Station
- Chicken Runs with healthy chooks
- Wormery
- The Peaceful Garden
- Classroom vegetable beds for each classroom
- Courtyards where children sit for lunch with an amazing system for recycling kai scraps
- Nature Walks
- Sensory Gardens
- A construction garden
- A gorgeous Mātāpono display in their hall
- Orchard with 'Leaf Cutter Bee Houses' and companion planting
- Projects at hand eg: HALO; setting traps minimize rodents (with DOC support).
- Framed ceramics on the backs of seats
- Systems in place to manage ~ SMART GOALS! (Smart - Measurable - Attainable - Realistic - Timebound)




