Types of waste





Where have we come from and what do we know now?

This activity is a sorting and classifying game you can create and use anytime for stimulating discussion and thoughts about waste. Add your learning to your **Pool of Knowledge** to help grow your understandings of waste.

You will need

- A set of the 'Types of Waste' cards printed out onto card, or
- Multiple examples of paper, plastics, metals, batteries, glass, textiles and pictures of food and garden waste, or
- Tip out the class rubbish/ recycling bin/ lunchboxes and use the real thing (check health and safety factors first).

Method

- 1. Set out the waste examples and gather your class in a large circle around them.
- 2. Take a moment to look and scan all of the types of waste.
- 3. Are there any 'categories' of things that stand out? Record everyone's thoughts.
- 4. Form groups and sort the waste examples into 'like' categories. For example: food waste, green garden waste, paper, recyclable plastic, non-recyclable plastic, glass, metal, aluminium, other.
- 5. Introduce the terms 'organic/ biodegradable', and 'inorganic/ non-biodegradable'. Which types of waste are they? Move the examples of waste or cards around into these two categories.
- 6. Discuss what might happen to different waste. What types of waste could you: Reduce, or avoid creating? Re-use again? Recycle? Move the examples of waste or cards again into these categories. What's left? Is it possible to 'Rethink' these items?
