This document is designed to support Boards of Trustees and management teams in becoming confident with the Enviroschools kaupapa and, how it can be embedded in the strategy of your school.

Enviroschools is a holistic kaupapa working to co-create resilient and sustainable communities through learning and action – a nationwide movement for positive change that you are a part of! Across the motu we are seeing thousands of innovative and inspiring ways to care for Papatūānuku, learn creatively and live healthy, sustainable lives.

The network includes over 1,500 schools and early childhood centres – all on unique, self-paced pathways towards sustainability. Nationally, Enviroschools is supported by Toimata Foundation and founding partner Te Mauri Tau, alongside 90+ regional partners that include councils and early childhood education associations.

School communities develop skills, understanding, knowledge and confidence through planning, design and creating a sustainable place. Learning and action projects are led by young people with the support of adults around them.

Enviroschools Guiding Principles - Ngā Mātāpono

Our kaupapa guides all that we do and is embodied in five guiding principles that underpin the Enviroschools journey and a whole school approach.

Empowered Learners

participate in meaningful ways in their community. Their unique perspectives and questions are valued and honoured. They feel connected to the whenua and support each other as a learning community to create meaningful change and hopeful action.

Learning for Sustainability

is a holistic, action and futurefocused approach to learning, that engages our whole selves and addresses all aspects of our local and global environment.

Te Ao Māori

honours tangata whenua of this land. When we are envisioning and taking action for a sustainable future in our community, it is important that we are doing so alongside local hapū.

Respect for Diversity

is celebrated, and all forms of identity and ability are respected. Cultural traditions and practices from all people are experienced, valued and appreciated in learning spaces, honouring practices led by that community. Access to safe and engaging learning is available to everyone.

Sustainable Communities

act in ways that nurture all aspects of nature, including people, now and in the future.

By working together and supporting each other we create safe, healthy, equitable and thriving communities.

What could Enviroschools Guiding Principles look like in your place?

- Ākonga getting involved, taking responsibility, standing in their own rangatiratanga, and making decisions
- Students planning their curriculum, building their designs, leading projects
- Discussing issues with Board members, staff incorporating student ideas into school planning.
- Personal and relevant learning experiences, reflection and critical thinking, problem solving and decision making
- Learning IN, ABOUT and FOR the environment:
- IN... sensory experiences in nature, connecting with atua in the environment
- ABOUT... mapping soil types, sketching plants and animals, understanding whanaungatanga

 inter-relatedness
- FOR... buying sustainable products, designing Zero Waste practices, using green technologies, creating native habitats, conserving water and making wise use of energy.

- Exploring Māori knowledge, grounding learning in mātauranga Māori
- Weaving te reo Māori and tikanga Māori into everyday experiences and practices
- Honouring tūpuna/ ancestors
- Forming authentic reciprocal relationships with tangata whenua
- Finding out about pūrakau, karakia, kawa and tikanga held by local hapū.

- Learning opportunities that include languages spoken at home, histories, stories and cultural values
- Spaces that reflect different cultural practices, cultural solutions to environmental issues
- Discussions that encourage a variety of viewpoints and cater for diverse identities and learning styles
- Participatory decision making, a place where a culture of care and inclusion is fostered.

- Working collaboratively with all learners within the community, inter-generational engagement
- Conserving and restoring local biodiversity, recycling and minimising waste, using renewable resources
- Promoting peaceful and fair practices, fundraising for ecological and ethical projects, considering future generations in planning.

In Enviroschools, sustainability is integrated into the **whole school or centre life**, by walking our talk and generating learning opportunities on the collective journey towards a healthy peaceful and sustainable environment. This holistic Enviroschools approach covers four key areas:

Place – Wāhi | Practices – Tikanga | Programmes – Kaupapa Ako | People and Participation – Tangata


At the heart of Enviroschools is the


Action Learning
Cycle, encouraging an enquiry-based process of exploration, decision-making, design, action and reflection. It is a key tool that can be applied to a specific project or an entire process in an Enviroschools Journey.



Enviroschools and the National Education and Learning Priorities (NELP)

The Enviroschools kaupapa directly links to the NELP objectives and helps to support centres and schools to provide spaces that ensure the wellbeing of all. The five Guiding Principles of Enviroschools support each objective, particularly where they are learner centric, inclusive and incorporate mātauranga Māori.





Things to consider when strategically planning for Enviroschools

Understanding of, and commitment to Enviroschools from management and governance will help support effective strategic planning and engagement for this action-based learning approach.

Enviroschools provides a flexible adaptive framework so centres and schools can design their own unique pathway. Enviroschools processes involve the whole community – young people, teachers, caretakers, management and governance, whānau and the wider community each have roles and responsibilities.

Enviroschools works with the National Curriculum in schools to provide a programme that goes beyond four walls, encompassing a whole school/ centre approach. Curriculum acknowledges both the formal and informal curriculum and considers all influences on learning. This includes the messages that young people receive from their surroundings and role models, and the way in which the school operates and makes decisions.

Enviroschools links to current practice, effective pedagogy, curriculum and both localised and government priorities (NELP). Enviroschools strategies are important mechanisms to support ongoing learning and action – so change becomes embedded in your Enviroschool culture over time.

Support for your school in implementing the Enviroschools Kaupapa

In signing on to be part of Enviroschools, your school is joining a nationwide network of over 1500 schools and early childhood centres on the sustainability pathway.

Your teaching teams have access to:
